
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
The Canadian Ski Council's Facts and Stats document outlines the latest demographic research on Canadian skiers, snowboarders and cross country skiers and is based on data collected by the Print Measurement Bureau (PMB). The 2012/13 Facts and Stats are compiled from the PMB 2012-2013 2 year database, with surveys collected with Canadian consumers between October 2010 and September 2012.

1. ALPINE SKIER/SNOWBOARDER VISITS - HISTORICAL


Alpine skier/snowboard visits is the measure of the number of times skiers visited ski areas, and therefore measures skier volume or frequency in a season (as opposed to the number of people who ski/snowboard).

3. SNOWSPORTS PARTICIPATION RATE IN CANADA 2012/13

The following chart shows the participation rate for all skiers and snowboarders by province/region. While the participation rate for Canada is 17.0% of the Canadian population over the age of 12, the rate varies by province. Please note that this data includes those who participate in cross country skiing as well as alpine skiing and snowboarding. There is also some cross participation that is included in these numbers. The data that is included on the following pages of this document has been collected from Spring 2013 Print Measurement Bureau 2 year report.

Market Size

Skiers

- 7.4% (2,239,000) of Canadians 12 years of age and over downhill ski (2013) compared to
 7.1% in 2012 or 2,126,000
- 5.3% increase from 2012 or 113,000

Snowboarders

 4.6% (1,400,000) of Canadians 12 years of age and over snowboard (2013) compared to 4.8% (1,429,000) in 2012.

Cross Country

• 4.9% of Canadians 12 years of age and over (1,470,000) cross country ski compared to 4.6% (1,376,000) in 2012.

Skiers

- 17.0% (381,000) are 12-17 years-old (2013) compared to 15.1% (320,000) in 2012
- 13.0% (290,000) are 18-24 years-old (2013) compared to 13.5% (287,000) in 2012
- 18.2% (408,000) are 25-34 years-old compared to 17.7% (377,000) in 2012
- 18.9% (425,000) are 35-44 years-old compared to 18.6% (396,000) in 2012
- 18.5% (414,000) are 45-54 years-old compared to 21.2% (451,000) in 2012
- 9.8% (220,000) are 55-64 years-old compared to 10.0% (212,000) in 2012
- 65+ skiers signify 4.5% (101,000) of all alpine skiers compared to 3.9% (83,000) in 2012
- 58.1% of all alpine skiers (2013) live in households with children under the age of 18 compared to 54.1% in 2012.

Snowboarders

- Over half of all Canadian snowboarders, 56.3% (787,000) are between the ages of 12-24.
- 27.4% (383,000) are 12-17 years-old (2013) compared to 25.3% (361,000) in 2012
- 28.9% (404,000) are 18-24 years-old (2013) compared to 29.7% (424,000) in 2012
- 21.5% (301,000) are 25-34 years-old compared to 23.3% (332,000) in 2012
- 12.1% (170,000) are 35-44 years-old compared to 10.2% (145,000) in 2012
- 6.9% (97,000) are 45-54 years-old compared to 8.2% (117,000) in 2012
- 2.2% (31,000) are 55-64 years-old compared to 2.5% (36,000) in 2012
- 65+ aged snowboarders signify 1.0% (14,000) of all snowboarders compared to 0.9% (13,000) in 2012

 54.1% of all snowboarders (2013) live in households with children under the age of 18 compared to 52.6% in 2012.

Cross Country

- 12.2 % (179,000) are 12-17 years-old (2013) compared to 11.1% (153,000) in 2012
- 10.2% (150,000) are 18-24 years-old (2013) compared to 10.1% (139,000) in 2012
- 12.2% (180,000) are 25-34 years-old compared to 15.2% (209,000) in 2012
- 17.1% (251,000) are 35-44 years-old compared to 14.6% (201,000) in 2012
- 21.4% (315,000) are 45-54 years-old compared to 20.2% (278,000) in 2012
- 15.2% (223,000) are 55-64 years-old compared to 16.9% (232,000) in 2012
- 65+ aged cross country skiers signify 11.6% (171,000) of all cross country skiers compared to 11.9% (163,000) in 2012
- 43.1% of all cross country skiers (2013) live in households with children under the age of 18 compared to 41.1% in 2012.

Gender Profile

Skiers

- 57.9% (1,296,000) of skiers are male (2013) compared to 55.5% (1,179,000) in 2012
- 42.1% (942,000) of skiers are female (2013) compared to 44.5% (946,000) in 2012
- 54.4% of all alpine skiers are married or living together (2013) compared to 58.3% in 2012.
- 2.6% of all alpine skiers are divorced (2013) compared to 2.3% in 2012.

Snowboarders

- Snowboarders tend to be young, single males.
- 66.4% of all snowboarders are single, divorced, separated or widowed and 33.6% of all snowboarders are married or living together.
- 57.2% (801,000) of all snowboarders are male, 42.8% (599,000) are female.

Cross Country

- 60.3% of all cross country skiers are married or living together compared to 39.5% that are single, divorced, separated or widowed.
- 53.1% (781,000) of all cross country skiers are male, 46.9% (689,000) are female.

Language Profile

Skiers

• In 2013, 63.6% (1,425,000) speak English at home, with 23.2% (520,000) speaking French

Snowboarders

• 68.0% (952,000) of snowboarders speak English at home and 21.0% (294,000) speak French at home.

Cross Country

• 62.9% (925,000) of cross country skiers speak English at home and 29.3% (431,000) speak French at home.

Regional Share

Skiers

- 35.6% (796,000) of all alpine skiers live in communities with a population between 100,000 and 2 million.
- 21.7% (486,000) of all alpine skiers live in communities with a population less than 100,000.

Snowboarders

- 36.1% (505,000) of all snowboarders live in a community with a population between 100,000 and 2 million people.
- 26.4% (370,000) of all snowboarders live in communities with a population less than 100,000.

Cross Country

- 39.9% (586,000) of all cross country skiers live in a community with a population between 100,000 and 2 million people.
- 28.9% (425,000) of all cross country skiers live in communities with a population less than 100,000.

Household Income

Skiers

- 84.7% of all alpine skiers have annual household incomes over \$50,000.
- 19.3% of all alpine skiers have annual household incomes between \$75,000 and \$99,999
- 49% of alpine skiers have annual household incomes over \$100,000.
- 81.3% (1,821,000) of all alpine skiers own their own dwelling (as opposed to renting).

Snowboarders

- 75.4% of all snowboarders have annual household incomes over \$50,000.
- 14.9% of all snowboarders have annual household incomes between \$75,000 and \$99,999
- 40% of all snowboarders have annual household incomes over \$100,000.
- 71.2% (997,000) of all snowboarders own their own dwelling (as opposed to renting).

Cross Country

- 79.1% of all cross country skiers have annual household incomes over \$50,000.
- 17.3% of all cross country skiers have annual household incomes between \$75,000 and \$99,999
- 43.7% of all cross country skiers have annual household incomes over \$100,000.
- 82.7% (1,215,000) of all cross country skiers own their own dwelling (as opposed to renting).

Employment Profile

Skiers

• 58.1% of alpine skiers are employed full time, 12.4% are employed part time and 29.5% are not employed.

Snowboarders

• 44.6% of snowboarders are employed full time, 21.1% are employed part time and 34.3% are not employed.

Cross Country

• 52.0% of cross country skiers are employed full time, 13.7% are employed part time and 34.3% are not employed.
